1. Course Objectives:

- A. Learn the basic safe practices while operating the Planer
- B. Learn operating practices that are prohibited due to safety
- C. Learn how the planer operates: Feed rollers, Table rollers, cutterhead
- D. Learn how to select boards in the rough and prepare them before planning, and how to check grain direction
- E. Learn proper procedure for feeding wood through the planer.
- F. Learn importance of supporting board as it enters and exits planer. Preventing snipe
- G. Learn how to change feed speed of planer. Slower the rate of feed the smoother the planed surface.
- H. Learn minimum 3/16" and maximum 5" board thickness
- I. Learn how to produce parallel edges with planer

2. Class Materials

- A. Several pieces of joined lumber.
- B. One piece of bowed rough lumber

3. Lesson Plan

Explain Safety Issues

- A. Never operate any machinery when tired, sleepy or while taking medications or drugs that might cause drowsiness.
- B. Do not wear baggy or lose fitting clothing
- C. Remove all jewelry where possible
- D. Footware should provide good traction and protect the toes.
- E. Long hair should be secured under a cap so as not to hinder vision and pony tails should be secured.

- F. Always wear approved safety glasses or goggles.
- G. Always use hearing protection.
- H. Always keep tool surfaces clean.
- I. Always be aware of others working in the vicinity of the planer, particularly the outfeed side of the planer
- J. Always make sure the planer is in proper working order. Any unusual noises or vibrations: stop the joiner immeadiately and investigate cause.
- K. Never use the planer with dull cutter blades
- L. Always provide sufficient support for material on both the infeed and outfeed side of the planer.
- M. Always seek assistance when handling heavy or awkward boards or anytime you are uncomfortable or unsure how to proceed.
- N. Always respect the planer for what in may do to you or someone nearby if there is a lapse in safe operating procedures.

PLANER CANNOT BE SUBSTITUTED FOR A JOINTER, IT CANNOT BE USED TO FLATTEN WARPED OR BOWED BOARDS, IT CANNOT BE USED TO MAKE ITS OWN FACE SIDES AND FACE EDGES.

Show the location of:

- A. Power on/off switch
- B. Circuit breaker for planer

Show how to

- A. Raise and lower table
- B. Adjust thickness or depth of cut. Remember the best performance is when the depth of cut is 1/16" or less.
- C. Plane short stock
