

Our July meeting is really something to look forward to! It is rare to have a group like this, "Pioneers of the GWG", together at one time, all fine craftsmen in their own right, and all instrumental in the origin and growth of our Guild. We are now at a sustained level of about 700 members in good standing, a significant gain from the original five founding members. Come and hear what they have to say.

Recently Rudd Veltman did an analysis of Guild members versus shop users. The criteria was based on members that logged in on the touchscreen as they entered the shop from May 2015 through April 2016. Interestingly, about 40 percent of our members never signed in (or used the shop) during this period. Of the approximately 425 members that did sign in, only about 250 members signed in at least twelve times (average of 1 visit per month). Just 100 members signed in at least 36 times! You can draw your own conclusions from this information.

Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find a new policy on member project storage. This has been precipitated and made necessary by a number of things. Some background: Our original shop included no room for project storage. Some cubbies were donated and installed, but soon became filled. A policy was instituted to regulate storage and allow a minimal space for active, repeat active, projects. It soon became a nightmare. When our new shop was acquired a study was done on project storage needs (as well as charitable projects), and an area was set aside for this purpose. This was soon filled and more bins were created. These soon became filled. The Education Center is for educating and training members, to build charitable projects, and to serve the personal needs of members when possible. We are not a storage facility! A quick glance through the current bins shows bin after bin filled with scraps, wood not being used for any project, and all kinds of other stuff. A few actually contain an on-going project. We have more than adequate space if everyone would just adhere to our policies, clean out the junk, and use this space only for current, ongoing projects. The new policy will hopefully make things better for members and supervision. If it leads to "permanent" or unencumbered storage, it will be revised again. Please remember, we are not a storage facility!

One last thought. Our Guild has always operated on the "honor system", even for wood sales and other areas. Every time I entertain a guest or visitor, they often comment on the friendliness, neat appearance, and character of our members. It is the people that make our Guild outstanding, and it is outstanding people that we attract as members. Let's keep it that way!

### More changes!

If you are a shop user you have probably noticed that we have a new method of offering soft drinks in the shop. The old vending machine has been replaced by a beverage cooler. Thanks to an anonymous donor for purchasing this cooler, and to Robert Tepper for keeping it stocked on an ongoing basis. A variety of soft drinks will be available in the cooler, and bottled water will be in the break room refrigerator. Its success depends on you! There is a "collection box" in the cooler and refrigerator, and each item is just 50 cents; nothing is free! This is pretty much a break-even process at these prices, but any extra will go towards operating the shop. Please do not even think of taking water or soft drinks from the refrigerator in the auditorium. These items are for monthly meetings only and not for use by anyone other than our Event Manager.

Thanks again to the responsible members for making this happen!

### **New Project Storage Policy**

Our Shop Manager Mac Bowman proposed and the Board approved a new policy for member project storage. This policy will be implemented for a six month trial period, then reviewed and revised as necessary. Its intent is to provide minimal storage for current, ongoing member storage of parts, pieces, and partially completed projects for short durations. It is not intended to provide permanent or long term storage, or for items not intended to be used in a current project. Mac hopes this will "provide a fair and equitable means of providing temporary storage at the GWG shop".

A member seeking storage will get a "storage tag" to place on the bin or project, containing a start and expiration date. Two free 30 day tags (30 consecutive days) will be available each year, not to run consecutively. Beyond these 30 day periods, a "license tag" for 30, 60 or 90 days will be available for a fee of \$15 per month, paid in advance. Any storage out of date will be removed to the "delinquent storage area".

We cannot afford to build new outside storage facilities, and the general consensus of the Board is that we should not take priority space out of the existing shop area for storage. Let's try this for six months and evaluate it at that time. Mac is currently tweaking the administrative process for this, and will implement as soon as practical.

## **Limited Offer**

## Guild's Youth attended the annual symposium of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW)

Eight members of the Guild's Youth Program attended the annual symposium of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) held in Atlanta June 9-12. They had the opportunity to see over two thousand turned objects, ranging from simple bowls and pens to at least one sculptural piece priced at \$65,000.00. There were over 800 "Beads of Courage" bowls donated and on display. During the three day event, they each participated in free woodturning classes provided by AAW, with internationally-known woodturners providing the instruction. Various vendors and the AAW had set up an area for the youth turning sessions which was outfitted with twenty-five fully-equipped Jet midi-lathes, with each lathe setup and accessories valued at over \$1500.00 retail. A raffle was held during the symposium, and at the end of the session, six of our eight youth attendees had won a fully equipped lathe to bring home. A seventh was a sister of a winner, and the eighth bought a lathe at a very substantial discount. The adult sponsors were able to bring all seven lathes home to Greenville.
